I will never forget the first death I experienced as a parish pastor. His name was Doug. He was 34 years old, and he died in the mountains of Colorado. He was a high powerline repairman. If you go online, you can find video footage of these amazing people and the helicopter pilots who get them where they need to go. At any rate, on this particular trip into the Rocky Mountains, something went wrong, the helicopter crashed, and both the pilot and Doug died. As you can imagine, his family was devastated at the awful news of his death.

I will never forget the 7 mile car ride south of Lisbon to their farm. I was nervous and unsure of myself. I prayed for God to help me comfort and care for this family. I wondered what I would say, how I should act, and what I had to do. One thing is for certain, God is good, and as tragic as the whole situation was for this family, everything went well. There were lots of tears of course, but the good people of Trinity Lutheran were there for that family, and a young "baby" pastor survived his first death and funeral. Even the sermon was OK.

By the end of two weeks, I had three deaths and three funerals. Doug was 34, Randine was 84, and Kristi was 13. Baptism by fire! Of course, I am not making light of this. It was hard time for me, and heartbreaking for families. But with lots of prayer, lots of support, and a good God guiding us, we made it through those days, just like ULC is doing right now. We too have had our share of deaths recently. Since January 1, 2017, we have had 10 deaths and 9 funerals. The ages of these people were 100, 85, 71, 88, 24, 48, 83, 53, 94, and 89.

What is the deal with all this death? I don't know. What I do know, however, is God's response to death. In the story of Jesus and his friend Lazarus, the Bible says that Lazarus had been dead 4 days when Jesus arrived. The people gathered to grieve Lazarus' death, were gossiping about Jesus, wondering why this great healer could not heal his friend. Their powerlessness in the face of death, and their deep grief over the loss of Lazarus, made Jesus very, very sad. John 11 says that Jesus was greatly disturbed, and that he wept alongside of them.

But the story doesn't end there. At this time, Jesus reveals one of his main purposes for coming from heaven to the earth. He came to defeat death. He came to overcome this very powerful adversary of the human race. He came to swallow up death forever. What Jesus did was very beautiful. He faced death straight on and said, "Come out, Lazarus," and Lazarus was alive again. Jesus raised him from death and the grave. He came out of the tomb, and his family and friends unwrapped his burial clothes, and their grief turned into joy.

This story reminds me of several important things. First, we are mortal, and death is inevitable for us. It is not unthinkable for Lazarus to die, nor is it for the 10 people we have recently lost, nor is it for any of us. Second, Jesus sees how hard death and grief is for us, and he is greatly disturbed at our pain. He is very sad because of our losses, and cries many tears with us. Third, Jesus changes everything by raising Lazarus. In that great moment, he shows that God is more powerful than death, and that from God's perspective, death is not an end.

It is only after the resurrection of Jesus that we too share God's perspective, seeing death not as an end, but rather a gateway. Now we see this thing that hurts us in life, what so deeply hurt Doug's family 28 Julys ago, is overcome, defeated. So when we think of all our precious people who have died, we think of them as quite alive and with the Lord. Jesus has great compassion for us and our grief, and because he loves us, as well as those we are grieving for, he has raised them all the way to heaven, where one day we will see them again.

Ash Wednesday Worship is March 1

Lent begins with one of the most meaningful worship services of the Christian year, Ash Wednesday. This service includes confession of sins and imposition of ashes, as well as Holy Communion. Confession and ashes remind us we are sinful and mortal people, and Communion provides us with grace to receive forgiveness and everlasting life from God. Join us this Ash Wednesday for worship!



Wednesday Lenten theme: *Christ on Trial*

Christ was on trial. Two thousand years ago, Caiaphas and Pilate passed judgment on Jesus in Jerusalem. And though the verdict passed down at that trial was a miscarriage of justice, the result fulfilled God's purpose: to save the world by sacrificing his Son.

Christ is on trial. Today, his saving act, his being in the world, his radical teachings all demand a reaction. Every human heart must wrestle with questions like: Who is this Christ? Is he who he claims to be? What does he mean for me and my living? Daily, Christ is on trial.

Christ is on trial this Lenten season each Wednesday. Through a series of dramatic readings, court will be in session to determine who Christ is. Scriptural evidence is analyzed, and eye witnesses share their encounters with Jesus. The question: Who is Christ for you?

Resources for Lent 2017

Wooden Neck Crosses - This is one of our most favorite Lenten traditions. We will provide wooden neck crosses for people to wear during Lent and beyond. Some even like to hang them in their car.

Wooden Pocket Cross Coins - You can carry these in your purse or your pocket. They are your reminder that wherever you go, you are not alone, your Savior, Jesus Christ, is always with you.

Lenten Coin Folders - We use coin folders to set aside a quarter a day during the 40 days of Lent. This money will go to sponsor our new missionary, whose name the Church Council will be revealing.

Feed My Starving Children



Here is the breaking news for Feed My Starving Children in 2017:

- © Once again the community of Grand Forks is coming together to pack food for starving children across the world. This year that weekend is March 31-April 2.
- © As a community, we have currently raised about \$31,000 of the needed \$88,000 in order for us to pack 400,000 meals this year.
- One way ULC is raising money for FMSC is through noisy offerings in January, February, and March.
- Solution You have the opportunity to sign up to help pack at the upcoming event. ULC has two packing times: Saturday, April 1, 2:30-4:30pm and Sunday, April 2, 4:30-6:30pm. Sign up sheets are available in the narthex. If these times do not work for you, but you would still like to volunteer, you may go to the website, fmsc.org, and sign up for a shift of your choice.

Remember that 22 cents will provide one meal for a hungry child in our world, \$22 provides 100 meals for hungry children in an orphanage, and \$80 feeds one child for one whole year.
